





IN JANUARY 2011 THE EAEVE TEAM VISITED THE FACULTY AND PROPOSED CONDITIONAL APPROVAL WITH <u>ONE</u> <u>CATEGORY 1 DEFICIENCY</u> MOTIVATED BY THE LACK OF ESTABLISHED LONG TERM TEACHING ACTIVITY ON THE FOLLOWING POINTS:

- 1. 24hours/7days EMERGENCY SERVICE AND INTENSIVE CARE UNIT FOR COMPANION ANIMALS
- 2. SMALL ANIMAL HOSPITALISATION SERVICE
- 3. MOBILE CLINIC
- 4. LARGE ANIMAL ISOLATION UNIT
- 5. <u>TEACHING IN EQUINE SURGERY AND MEDICINE WITH THE AID OF CONTRACT PROFESSORS</u>
- 6. CASE LOAD FROM THE RE-BUILD NECROPSY FACILITY





IN APRIL 2011 OUR FACULTY WAS CONDITIONALLY APPROVED BY THE ECOVE BOARD WITH <u>ONE</u> <u>CATEGORY 1 DEFICIENCY</u> (LACK OF LONG TERM CLINICAL TEACHING ACTIVITY):

"Lack of established long-term clinical teaching activity and related lack of case load as result of the very recent outsourcing of teaching activity and the very recent installation of emergency service, hospitalisation service and ambulatory clinic"

FACULTY TEACHING (58) AND SUPPORT STAFF (52) IS THE SAME AS IN THE PREVIOUS ACADEMIC YEAR


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1.24hours/7days EMERGENCY SERVICE AND INTENSIVE CARE UNIT FOR COMPANION ANIMALS













THE 24/7 EMERGENCY SERVICE AND INTENSIVE CARE UNIT FOR COMPANION ANIMALS HAS BEEN <u>FULLY</u> OPERATIVE SINCE JANUARY 2011

PERSONNEL

11 FACULTY STAFF FROM INTERNAL MEDICINE, SURGERY, OBSTETRICS AND ANIMAL REPRODUCTION AND DIAGNOSTIC IMAGING

10 CONTRACT PRACTITIONERS, OF WHICH 2 EXCLUSIVELY FOR SURGICAL EMERGENCIES

- Contract practitioners cost approximately <u>78,000 euro</u>
- •Funds come from the hospital earnings, departmental funds and university financing (112,000 euro)





Organization

DAY SHIFT, FROM 8:00 am TO 8:00 pm:

1 clinician working exclusively in emergency admittance and another 1 in intensive care, assisted by <u>at least 4</u> <u>students</u> involved in professional training "tirocinio"

NIGHT SHIFTS AND WEEK-ENDS:

1 contract practioners and <u>2 students</u> involved in professional training "tirocinio" are present and 1 permanent clinical staff member for each discipline is on call





EACH STUDENT <u>ACTIVELY PARTICIPATES IN CLINICAL</u> <u>CASE MANAGEMENT:</u>

from the initial clinical evaluation and admittance, the entire diagnostic process and therapeutic regime, all under the supervision and guidance of the head clinician on duty

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2. SMALL ANIMALS HOSPITALIZATION SERVICE







- •The activity of the Small Animal hospitalisation service is structured in the same way as the Emergency service (day and night shifts)
- Also the exposure of each student to the cases handled is the same

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3. MOBILE CLINIC









ORGANIZATION

•Students are taken to farms with the faculty mobile clinic accompanied by faculty teaching staff in different disciplines.

10 contact professors (8 for cattle; 2 for horses) their own vehicles to transport small groups, or more often, individual students, for practicals

•Farm visits are carried out in collaboration with farm veterinarians and farmers.





•activity is recorded both in the teachers' register and in the student's log book (libretto diario). the registers are held in the dean's office





- •Faculty mobile clinic activities are reserved for the students in professional training "tirocinio"
- •during the period Jan. 1st, 2011 March 15th, 2012 the faculty mobile clinic was active for 45 services (20 swine herds; 16 cattle farms; 9 Equine clinic)
- ·each visit involved a maximum of 4 students.

BOVINE HERD HEALTH MANAGEMENT











•DURING THE ABOVE PERIOD, CATTLE WERE VISITED INDIVIDUALLY AND EACH STUDENT WAS RESPONSIBLE FOR AT LEAST ONE OF THESE ACTIONS:

- > Physical examination
- > Blood sampling
- Milk sampling
- > Rectal examination and faecal collection
- > Hoof examination and treatment (podiatry)
- > Partecipate to surgery

SWINE HERD HEALTH MANAGEMENT





- > Single animal and herd examinations
- > Blood and faecal sampling
- > Intramuscular injections
- Vaccinations

- During this period, each student handled approximately 25 pigs
- <u>DISEASES WERE DISCUSSED WITH TEACHING</u> STAFF AND PREVENTIVE MEASURES PROPOSED





•TEACHERS FROM ANIMAL PRODUCTION ALSO TOOK THE STUDENTS IN PROFESSIONAL TRAINING "TIROCINIO" TO PIG FARMS TO CARRY OUT ULTRASOUND DIAGNOSIS OF PREGNANCY SOWS.

Each student diagnosed approximately 20-30 pregnant sows





BOVINE OBSTETRICS









- •Under the teachers' supervision, each student performed a complete gynaecological and ultrasound examination on his/her own.
- •Students had to diagnose pathological states and propose specific treatments
- •Each student handled no less than 50 gyneacological cases in addition to those examined inside the Faculty

• THE CLINICAL ACTIVITIES ARE CARRIED OUT UNDER THE SUPERVISION OF CLINIC'S PRACTITIONERS

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4 -LARGE ANIMAL ISOLATION UNIT







- •All activities in the large animal isolation are carried out following specific standard operating procedures
- •Animals of different species have been isolated due to suspicion of an infective disease state, due to the presence of diarrhoea, respiratory signs or neurological symptoms
- •Students operate under the supervision of the clinician, usually a member of facultyu or junior staff from the veterinary teaching hospital
- Students carry out clinical examinations and take samples

ACTIVITIES REALIZED AT THE LOCAL SLAUGHTERHOUSE

In order to increase case load and hands-on experience in equine medicine and surgery, faculty has stipulated a contract with the nearby slaughterhouse to carry out practical teaching activity on horses destined for slaughter and that are temporarily housed in the abattoir's stalls





Unfortunately, due to concerns for the safety of students and staff that could be only fully evaluated during the first rounds of practicals, the activities at the slaughterhouse are currently carried out by limited a number of students involved in professional training "tirocinio"



•TO DATE 13 HORSES HAVE BEEN SUBMITTED TO CLINICAL EXAMINATION AND BLOOD SAMPLING





ACTIVITIES REALIZED IN AGREEMENT WITH CLINICS

• THE FACULTY HAS ALSO REACHED AN AGREEMENT WITH A PRIVATE CLINIC FOR EQUINE MEDICINE AND SURGERY LOCATED APPROXIMATELY 15 KM FROM THE FACULTY (EQUITECNICA E.C.S.N.C., NOCETO, PARMA - HEAD CLINICIAN DR. SERGIO ORSI)







•TO DATE THE STUDENTS FROM THE FACULTY HAVE CARRIED OUT 531 CASES

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6 - NECROPSY









- The number of necropsies carried out on both small and large animals for teaching purposes has generally increased
- the self-propelled large animal necropsy table has allowed us to carry out more necropsies on cows and horses.
- Students must operate the necropsies, record gross pathology and collaborate with the faculty staff to formulate a diagnosis
- Students must compile the autopsy report
